

Compound Sentences pages 370–371

A simple sentence has a subject and a predicate and expresses one idea.

A **compound sentence** is a sentence that contains two simple sentences joined by and, but, or or.

Example:

Thirty-nine different families have lived in the White House, and hundreds of

children have played there.
